The Moulding Foundation Building

Opened in February 2023, this state-of-the-art facility, sensitively designed by FaulknerBrowns is the new home to Royal School Manchester, as well as shared spaces for Royal College Manchester and community users.

The building includes; the Margaret Mason Hall, an assembly hall for 200 people with retractable seating, the Weston Dining Hall offering all students a chance to dine together, The Zochonis Assessment Suite, with a high-tech audiology testing room, not to mention a swimming centre comprising The Bertie Broome Swimming Pool, complete with moveable floor and self-depositing steps and The BAND Trust Hydrotherapy Pool.

We have pledged to redevelop our entire campus to create facilities that set the gold standard for all special education establishments. Over the past decade, we are proud to have built Sir Norman Stoller Way, a close of 17 residential care homes, an all-weather sports pitch, The Bradbury Cycling Centre - an inclusive cycle track and trail, and of course The Moulding Foundation Building. Our ambitions don't stop there.

Every part of the building has been acoustically designed in such a way to ensure little or no reverberation. Whether it be individual classrooms or the large assembly and dining halls, the needs of students with a hearing impairment or autistic spectrum disorders have been considered.

Hoists in classrooms and shared spaces, combined with wide corridors ensure **every student** has access to **every space**.

Wheelchair users can navigate their way around the space more freely. A staff member commented: "Transitioning is so much smoother now - in the old school, a lot of time was wasted manoeuvring mobility equipment around from room to room. Some students simply could not access certain areas, whereas now everyone can access everywhere, which is just amazing."



Promoting independence

The spacious corridors and passprotected doors also support independent transitions, allowing students to safely travel around the building throughout the school day.

Two accessible life skills rooms provide the opportunity to develop valuable skills needed both now and for the future.

are available, with support from specialist Assistive Technologists. These immersive spaces help teachers and Learning Support Assistants to meet the variety of sensory needs of each student, and are also helpful to bring students with challenging behaviours into a more positive calm space.

The purpose built Beaverbrooks Rebound Suite has allowed more students to access this impactful therapy.

Imagine not being able to relax and enjoy social spaces, or even have your lunch with your peers? This was the case for Royal School Manchester student, Aidan, who before moving into The Moulding Foundation Building would spend most of his school days in a room to himself, as the communal areas were too uncomfortably noisy and bright for him to tolerate.

After getting accustomed to his new, carefully designed classroom in The Moudling Foundation Building, as well as the acoustisically treated communal rooms, Aidan has been able to develop his ability to share spaces with his classmates, making new friends in the process. Aidan now explores his surroundings safely and even nagivates his way to the dining hall at meal times.

Aidan's teacher, Emily said:

"This has been truly life changing for Aidan. He now not only feels safe and comfortable in communal areas at school, but also has been able to access activities outside school that were just not possible before. With the combined effort of his teachers, support staff and family, plus access to these stateof-the-art facilities. Aidan can now take part in more opportunities available to him and more importantly, enjoy doing so."

"Parents were consulted in the planning process for the school, which was excellent. It just shows the thought that



Behaviours

The new building is a low-arousal, calm environment, and the increased space it provides enables more effective behaviour support.

Students have been showing a positive change in their behaviour since moving from the old school building, and overall the whole school cohort has seen a decrease of incidents within the classroom.

Positive Behaviour Support the Wave'

Senior teachers at Royal School Manchester have introduced an innovative **Positive Behaviour Support** programme called **Riding the Wave**.

The children and young adults at Seashell can experience heightened emotions, triggered by changes in routine and physical environments. Teaching staff are well atuned to recognising students' emotional states, and have introduced an innovative data capturing tool to help identify and reflect on when students are more or less stimulated to learn. Riding the Wave documents a student's mood throughout the day, acknowledging external factors that may have contributed to positive behaviours, or those of concern.

Senior Teacher at Royal School Manchester said: "This approach is student led, and uses behaviours as a form of communication, allowing students to express their personal preferences on what activities they prefer, rooms they feel most comfortable in and more importantly, which situations they find difficult to tolerate. From 'very anxious' to 'calm', to 'highly receptive' - behaviours are monintored on a regular basis, throughout the day."

The Moulding Foundation Building gives staff, for the first time,

the ability to adapt spaces to compliment students 'sensory diet' - sensory input needed to stay focused throughout the day. Factors such as lighting, sound and temperature can transform a room and bring a student into the right place to learn.

A parent commented on the project saying: "Riding the wave is a fantastic tool, and acts as a good handover point for staff and parents, to look at what mood/ behaviours have been displayed throughout the day."

Of the students who took part in the Riding the Wave programme...

50% decrease in 'very anxious' behaviour.

Almost **70%** decrease in 'anxious' behaviour.

Almost **70%** decrease in 'low mood'.

Over **80%** increase in 'calm/ regulated' behaviour.

Over **70%** increase in 'highly receptive' behaviour.

Over **40%** increase in 'calm/ highly receptive' behaviour.

(Comparing 3 months in the old school to 3 months in the new school building.)





We have our own Seashell curriculum that we have developed, which helps the students to be as independent and best communicators as they can be to take them into the future. The new building provides so many new opportunities for this.

In the last Ofsted inspection. it was pointed out that we have no ceiling for the students and the staff dont put any boundaries on what the students can achieve here. That aspiration allows students to make such progress.
